- Encouraged first-generation college students to study abroad




Gilman Alumni Ambassador

Robert served as the Economic Section Intern at the U.S. Embassy in Athens, Greece. The U.S. Department of State Student Internship Program provided Robert with the platform to network and engage with leading officials in American foreign affairs. These experiences included running a 5k marathon with embassy staff, meeting Secretary of Commerce Penny Pritzker during her high-profile visit to Athens, and preparing the comprehensive briefing materials for the new incoming ambassador.

Upon returning to the United States, Robert presented a portfolio at the annual School of Politics and Global Studies International Experience Consortium. As a Dorrance Scholar, Robert is connected to a network of first-generation college students who he was able to share his personal experience with and how he overcame certain obstacles to study abroad.

Robert plans to pursue a lifelong career with the U.S. Foreign Service, but not before earning his master's degree from a reputable international affairs program. Now an avid traveler, Robert also considers himself to be a 'global citizen' and life-long advocate for study abroad.
