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**AWARD NOTIFICATIONS ISSUED FOR GILMAN SCHOLARSHIP  
October 2020 Deadline**

*December 4, 2020* – The U.S. Department of State’s [Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship Program](#) is pleased to announce that more than 900 U.S. students from the October 2020 application deadline have been selected to receive Gilman scholarship awards. The recipients of this prestigious scholarship are American undergraduate students representing 307 colleges and universities across the United States who will study or intern in 87 countries through the end of 2021. Included in this group are recipients of the John McCain International Scholarship for the Children of Military Families (Gilman-McCain Scholarship). Also included are Gilman Scholars supported by the governments of France, New Zealand and Wales, and the Luso-American Development Foundation (FLAD) in Portugal, which have partnered with the Gilman Program to provide funding for additional students to study in their respective countries. Given the disruption of the pandemic, the Gilman Program is committed to offering flexibility to participants whose plans may be impacted. The Gilman Program will support students who are unable to start their programs abroad in their original destination or in the original timeframe by helping to identify alternative program options, by permitting students to defer to a program through the end of 2021, or by supporting participation in a virtual study abroad or international internship program.

The U.S. Department of State’s Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA) acknowledges all the American students who applied for the October 2020 deadline, as well as the 90 selection panelists from colleges and universities across the nation who reviewed their applications. We appreciate all the educators who continue to promote the Gilman Program and support their students in education abroad and international exchange experiences.

Gilman Scholars receive up to \$5,000, or up to \$8,000 if also a recipient of the Gilman Critical Need Language Award, to apply toward their study abroad or internship program costs. Since the program’s establishment in 2001, over 1,300 U.S. institutions have sent over 33,000 Gilman Scholars of diverse backgrounds to 151 countries around the globe. The program has

successfully broadened U.S. participation in study abroad, while emphasizing countries and regions where fewer Americans traditionally study. As Secretary of State Michael Pompeo has said, “American Students studying abroad play a key role as citizen ambassadors. They tell the American story and demonstrate American values and ideals to the entire world.”

The late Congressman Gilman, for whom the scholarship is named, served in the House of Representatives for 30 years and chaired the House Foreign Relations Committee. When honored with the Secretary of State’s Distinguished Service Medal in 2002, he said, “Living and learning in a vastly different environment of another nation not only exposes our students to alternate views but adds an enriching social and cultural experience. It also provides our students with the opportunity to return home with a deeper understanding of their place in the world, encouraging them to be a contributor, rather than a spectator in the international community.”

The Gilman Program is sponsored by the U.S. Department of State’s Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA) and is supported in its implementation by the Institute of International Education (IIE).
