This year, the U.S. Department of State's Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship Program is recognizing the U.S. colleges and universities that have sent the most Gilman Scholars abroad over the past two decades. These institutions were recognized for their support of equity, diversity, and accessibility in study abroad for American students through the Gilman Program.

Based on 20 years of data, the top 20 institutions are being honored across four categories: small, medium, and large institutions and associate degree granting institutions. Colleges and universities in 27 states, plus D.C. and Puerto Rico, are represented, as are 33 Minority Serving Institutions.
