Prior to Oxfam, Lilian has worked extensively as a Gender Scientist at various international organizations such as at the International Institute of Tropical Agriculture (IITA) and International Crops Research Institute for Semi-Arid Tropics (ICRISAT). She has authored and co-authored several peer-reviewed articles and book chapters on gender, climate change and food security and currently is an editorial Board member of the African Journal of Agricultural and Resource Economics. Lilian is a fellow with Gender-responsive Researchers Equipped for Agricultural Transformation (GREAT) with Universities of Cornell, USA and Makerere, Uganda. She holds a Ph.D. in Gender and Natural Resource Management from Brandenburg University of Technology, Cottbus-Senftenberg, Germany.









Mary Njenga

Research Scientist, Bioenergy, World Agroforestry (ICRAF)

Dr. Mary Njenga is a Research Scientist, Bioenergy at World Agroforestry (ICRAF) which merged with Centre for International Forestry Research (CIFOR) both of which are CGIAR centres and she is based in Nairobi, Kenya. She co-leads the Refugee Hosting Engagement Landscape (EL) programme in Africa and lead bioenergy work in Africa in the circular bioeconomy (CBE) transformative partnership platform (TPP) and climate change energy and low carbon development research theme. Her work involves designing, fund raising and managing transdisciplinary research and action projects including capacity development, reflective monitoring and evaluation learning (MEL) and gender integration and inclusion. She influences policy development through working closely with county and national governments. She has over 190 publications with a H-Index 25. She is an adjunct lecturer with Wangari Maathai Institute for Peace and Environmental Studies, University of Nairobi and an Affiliate with Gender Equity through Agricultural Research and education (GEARE), Ag Sciences Global, Penn State University. Her aim is to contribute to improving food and energy security, health, eliminating poverty, gender equality, sustainable ecosystems services, mitigating climate change and sustainable rural and urban development.



Janelle Larson

Associate Professor of Agricultural Economics, The Pennsylvania State University

Janelle Larson is an Associate Professor of Agricultural Economics at Penn State. Her research focuses on international rural development, with work primarily on gender in development, land markets, and value-chain analysis. She has been involved in USAID-funded research projects on gender and horticulture in Honduras, (funded by the Horticulture Innovation Lab at UC Davis), on gender in Cambodia (Sustainable Intensification Lab at Kansas State) and on women's time poverty in Ghana (Peanut Innovation Lab at Georgia). Larson is also the gender consultant for the Horticulture Innovation Lab at UC Davis and is co-Chair of the Innovation Lab Affinity Group for Gender. In addition, she leads a multi-disciplinary collaborative effort to develop livelihoods for highly vulnerable youth in Kenya involving undergraduate students.
